- Faith and Blue Weekend a partnership with local faith community leaders to strengthen positive connections that break down divides, decrease biases and increase familiarity.
- Breast Cancer Awareness Month a fundraising endeavor supporting breast cancer research. Officers design a t-shirt for purchase.

- **National Night Out** enhances the relationship between neighbors and law enforcement while bringing a true sense of community. Furthermore, it provides a great opportunity to bring police and the local community together under positive circumstances.
- **Cougars for Causes** (partners with Athletics) is a yearly food drive that benefits the food pantry for CSU students in need.
- **Blue Lights and Smiles** yearly visit to children in the hospital by police officers.
- **Shop with a Cop** partnership with the Fraternal Order of Police, holiday shopping with underprivileged youth.
